Course Objectives: The course familiarizes students with the scientific study of language and speech sounds. It provides practical training in phonetic transcription and pronunciation. Students will understand the structure, function, and importance of language in human communication.

Course Outcomes:

At the end of the course, the students will be able to:

- Understand what language is and how it works.
- Learn about the scientific study of language called linguistics.
- Understand how human speech sounds are produced.
- Practise transcription of simple English words using phonetic symbols.
- Understand the importance of correct pronunciation in communication.

The students will be required to attempt 5 questions in all selecting 1 question out of 2 from each unit. Question no 1 shall be compulsory, consisting of seven short answers type questions covering the entire syllabus. All questions carry equal marks.

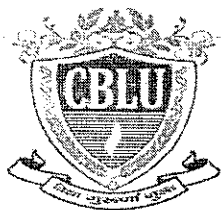

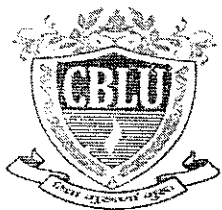

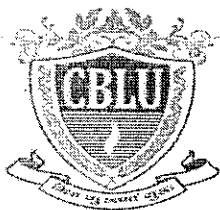
